Dear Mayor Porette:

Protecting the environment and reducing litter is a priority for many towns across the country but can be particularly important for those like Goleta.CA which is a beautiful coastal community. We would be happy to work towards common ground, enforcing the weight law, banning the intentional release of balloons and banning the use of balloons on beaches.

The adoption of any rules that could impact the sales and use of balloons could be economically detrimental to the many local businesses that have supplied balloons to members of your community over the years.

Research shows that while 8 million metric tons of plastics are found in the ocean (Ocean Conservancy), balloons do not constitute serious litter or ecological problem. On the California coast there are 12 categories of debris that are far more prevalent than balloons.

Each year several bills are introduced or reintroduced in several municipalities. By and large these legislative attempts result from skewed public perception of product safety, environmental impact and public health issues-developed through rumor, inaccurate news reports or "expert" assertions. Regrettably, despite industry's education efforts and failed attempts to "professionally" work with organization such as *Balloons Blow* and *Surfrider* balloon ban bills are reintroduced.

<u>The Balloon Council</u> (TBC), a non-profit organization established in 1990, is comprised of retailers, distributors and manufacturers dedicated to promoting the continued enjoyment of balloons and educating consumers and regulators about <u>Smart Balloon Practices</u> that provide guidelines for the proper use, handling and disposal of balloons.

TBC believes in education over legislation. Teaching people what they should and shouldn't do

when using balloons, such as always weighting and never intentionally releasing balloons into the air, and disposing of them properly after your celebration, go a long way towards keeping balloons from becoming litter.

In fact, we clarified our stance regarding balloon releases to say: "Balloons should never be released" and developed a new motto is "Don't let go: Weight. Inflate. Enjoy." This has become an integral part of our "Meet Faraday: Smart Balloon Practices" national educational outreach campaign, which also encourages children to sign a pledge to follow Smart Balloon Practices and not intentionally release balloons.

The industry has grown from a handful of small manufacturing companies, which supported family-owned distributors and retailers, to one that now produces products that are an integral part of festivities in California, this country and abroad. TBC's product labeling, media relations, public awareness and legislative initiatives have helped maintain consumer's rights to obtain full enjoyment from balloons.

Adoption of any proposed ordinance that would stem the sale and use of balloons would exasperate an already strained business climate and have a negative impact on members of the Goleta community and beyond who sell balloons for their livelihood.

TBC would appreciate the opportunity to work with the Goleta City Council and the business and community on an educational campaign over adopting any proposed regulations. Again, we would be happy to work towards common ground, enforcing the weight law, banning the intentional release of balloons and banning the use of balloons on the beach.








The Current California Balloon Law

The CA Balloon Law has been in effect since 1990 and requires all balloons filled with lighter than air gasses, like helium, to be sold attached to a weight, states that these balloons should never be released into the air.

Is the Current California Balloon Law Working?

YES, to an extent as retailers attempt to educate consumers to follow it. The number of outages have been greatly reduced with the increase in balloon sales along with the population growth of California from 1990 to today.

Does everyone abide by the law?

While many do follow this law, it is an honor system and not everyone abides by it and <u>no</u> city or state government currently enforces the law.

Did You Know?

The balloon industry uses the base standard of this CA law, always weighting and never releasing balloons, as two of the main principles taught in SMART Balloon Practices educational programs worldwide.

- Never intentionally release balloons.
- Always tie any helium-filled balloon to a weight.
- Never tie multiple helium-filled foil (mylar) balloons together.
- Always dispose of balloons properly.
- Never inhale helium.
- Always supervise children under the age of 3 when they are near balloons.

A Precedent Setting Solution

A joint partnership between the balloon industry and the City of Goleta.

Rather than taking balloons away from the great majority of people who follow the law, the City should start enforcing the current law and issuing citations. This action, in tandem with the balloon industries efforts, would result in true change and a reduction in balloon related outages.

The industry will launch an ongoing pilot program:

- TBC will contact all balloon sellers in the City of Goleta to inform them the city will begin enforcing The California Balloon Law. They will be required to provide a "Don't Release Balloons" card at the time of sale.
- The City will enforce the current California Balloon Law by issuing fines to violators.
- The balloon industry will provide updates of the progress of the non-conductive balloon material.



Goleta will be precedent setting as the first City to enforce the current law.
