SUBJECT: Award of Goleta City Grants for the 2018-19 Program Year

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve the 2018-19 Goleta City Grant Program funding recommendations of the Grant Funding Review Standing Committee.

BACKGROUND:

Over the past few years, the City Council has authorized \$100,000 annually for grant funding which is inclusive of the annual Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding received from the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), as well as the Goleta City Grant Program. For Fiscal Year (FY) 2018-19, the City is receiving \$32,454 in CDBG funding for services and programs. This results in \$67,546 of General Fund money being allocated to the Goleta City Grant Program.

The Goleta City Grant Program provides grants of up to \$5,000 for non-profit organizations involved in providing public services, educational and cultural activities such as music, art, dance, and recreation, as well as Goleta-oriented special events and regional projects that enhance and support the quality of life in Goleta.

The City Council's Grant Funding Review Standing Committee (Committee) reviews both CDBG and Goleta City Grant applications, and by adopted resolution, is composed of the Mayor and Mayor Pro Tempore as well as two citizens appointed by the Mayor. This year the citizen advisors are Arlene Raphael and Greg Husak.

On December 21, 2017, the City published a Notice of Funding Availability (in English and Spanish), inviting applications for FY 2018-19 funding through both the Goleta City Grant Program and the CDBG program. The deadline for submittal of grant applications was January 31, 2018. Of the 51 applications received altogether, one applicant rescinded their application. Of the 50 remaining applications, 9 applicants requested CDBG funding and 41 applicants requested funding under the City Grant Program. A total of \$255,575 in funding was requested for both grant programs. Of this amount,

\$74,500 was requested for CDBG with the remaining \$181,075 requested under the City Grant Program.

The 9 CDBG applications were initially evaluated by the Committee on March 7, 2018. City Council considered and approved of the Committee's CDBG funding recommendations on April 3, 2018, and staff included those preliminary funding allocations in the City's Draft 2018-19 CDBG Action Plan. The Draft Action Plan has since been updated to reflect the 2018-19 CDBG funding award received from HUD. The prior released Action Plan had been based on grant funding estimates totaling \$23,000 for programs and services, which had left \$77,000 available for City Grant Program funding.

The Committee met on March 29 and April 2, 2018 to consider the Goleta City Grant Funding awards based on that estimated total of \$77,000 available. Then the Committee met again on May 24, 2018 to adjust its preliminary funding recommendations for both programs, to reflect the \$67,546 in total available City Grant Program funding and \$32,454 available in CDBG funding. Of the 9 CDBG applications, 5 are being recommended by the Committee for funding under that program, and have been included in the updated Draft Action Plan. The remaining 4 CDBG applications were rolled over by the Committee to be considered for City Grant Program funding.

Staff is now pleased to bring forward the Committee's recommendations for the applicants seeking funding under this program.

DISCUSSION:

To serve as an organizational tool during deliberations for the City Grant Program funding, the Committee placed each application into one of the following categories:

- Educational programs
- The arts (music, dance, theater, art)
- Community events
- Services for low-income persons including the homeless
- Services/ programs for seniors
- Environmental/ wildlife/ animal programs
- Youth services, programs
- Miscellaneous programs/ services

This categorization of applications did not influence the funding determinations of the Committee, in terms of deciding to share funding across all categories or choosing to direct funding to a few priority categories. Rather, the Committee considered a variety of factors during deliberations and thoughtfully weighed each application over the course of the three meetings. Considerations included but were not limited to: how vital the City's funding would be to the program/ event/ service; the extent to which the program/ event/ service benefits Goleta residents; defining the City's role in funding educational activities and programs that would occur during school hours versus extracurricular

educational activities after school or outside of school; and use of funding for operations and maintenance versus programmatic or service uses.

The Committee is recommending that the available \$67,546 be awarded to 32 applicants. Together with the \$32,454 in CDBG awards recommended for 5 applicants, 37 of the 50 applicants are recommended to receive some type of award, although in many cases, the recommended awards are less than requested. It should also be noted that one of the applicants, the New Beginnings Counseling Center, is being recommended for a funding award that combines CDBG funding with City Grant Program funding. Attachment 1 provides a complete list of all CDBG and Goleta City Grant applications and the Committee's grant recommendations. Note that the City Grant applications and funding recommendations begin on Row 10 of the table in Attachment 1.

The recommended Goleta City Grants would support public services for the homeless, youth, seniors, and low-income people; a variety of programs in the areas of education and the arts; programs directed at the environment and wildlife; and various community events (see below summary table).

It is important to note that applications often cross over two or more categories. For example, many applications under the Educational Programs category could have also been placed under Youth Programs. Funds associated with any awarded grants will be available to applicants after July 1, 2018. To view a five-year historical summary of total funding requested and awarded under the City Grant Program, refer to the table in Attachment 2.

FISCAL IMPACTS:

For FY 2018-19, \$32,454 will be paid for out of CDBG (Fund 402) and the remaining \$67,546 from the General Fund for grant awards Award amounts from those funds, will

be updated in the mid-cycle budget. The increase in CDBG funding results in reducing the General Fund contribution of \$9,454, from its original budget estimate of \$77,000 for the 2018-19 Goleta City Grant Program (101-5-1100-220).

ALTERNATIVES:

City Council could choose to alter the Committee's recommendations for the Goleta City Grant Program funding by increasing or decreasing the award amounts to recommended applicants, and/ or by awarding funding to applicants not recommended by the Committee. City Council may also choose to hold off on awarding the 2018-19 Goleta City Grant Program funding, and direct staff and the Committee as appropriate on other options.
