SUBJECT: 2018 Public Safety Annual Report

RECOMMENDATION:

Receive a presentation of the 2018 Public Safety Annual Report.

BACKGROUND:

Annually, staff provides an update on public safety activities during the preceding calendar year. This update includes both law enforcement and fire department related services.

The Santa Barbara County Sheriff's Office (SBSO) has provided police services to the City of Goleta since July 1, 2002. In June of 2012, the City entered into a 5-year agreement with the County for law enforcement services with the Sheriff's Office. The agreement ran from July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2017 and was extended to June 30, 2018 via an approved amendment in June of 2017. A recent one-year contract for Fiscal Year 2018-19 was approved by City Council on June 19, 2018. Goleta is the largest contract city for the SBSO and also has the largest motor traffic safety unit. The current contracted staffing level is approximately 34.08 Full Time Equivalents (FTEs). The most recent FTE was added in December 2016, consisting of a full-time Parking Enforcement Officer assigned to Goleta for all parking and vehicle abatement concerns.

The City of Goleta is located within the County of Santa Barbara Fire Protection District; therefore, the Santa Barbara County Fire Department (SBCFD) provides "All-Risk" services at no cost to the City, including Advanced Life Support, residential, commercial and wildland fire suppression, technical rescue services, hazardous materials safety, public education, community service, and many other services not readily visible to the community.

SBCFD has sixteen fire stations strategically located within the County. Nine stations are located in the North County and seven are in the South County. Three fire stations and associated support staff are located within the City of Goleta.

DISCUSSION:

Santa Barbara County Sheriff's Office

Law Enforcement Patrol Operations: Upon incorporation, one of the original priorities for the City was to increase the enforcement of traffic related laws. Specifically, the Sheriff's Office was asked to place an emphasis on speed enforcement and accident reduction, priorities which continue today.

The Goleta Traffic Bureau, consisting of four motor officers, pursues a proactive approach to speed enforcement and accident prevention for the safety of the motoring and pedestrian public. They do this by showing a police presence in the community and engaging the public to learn their concerns. The Motor Unit has responded to specific community concerns by conducting crosswalk stings, cell phone violation enforcement, DUI checkpoints and assisting the Public Works Department with conducting updated speed surveys throughout the City. Four personnel are currently assigned to the traffic unit, including one Sergeant, one Senior Deputy, and two Deputies.

While enforcement is a priority for this unit, educating the public and collaborating with community groups and local schools also achieve the goal of reducing accidents and enhancing traffic safety. The Motor Unit has a high level of visibility and enforcement in and around local schools, along with participating in walk/bike to school functions.

School Resource Deputy (SRD): The City's law enforcement staffing also includes a School Resource Deputy, Sr. Deputy George Hedricks, who works closely with school administration, County Probation staff, the Parent Teacher Student Association (PTSA) and the residents in the surrounding community. The SRD continues to improve the educational and social environment at both the Dos Pueblos High School (DPHS) and Goleta Valley Junior High School (GVJH) campuses. The SRD's duties include, but are not limited to, leading and/or participating in felony and misdemeanor arrests, field interviews, criminal citations, offense reports, class hours and parent/student conferences. The SRD's ability to interact with the school administration, staff and students continues to be of great value to the school and the community at large. Currently, the SRD also serves as the Head Coach for the Varsity Baseball team at DPHS. This is an excellent example of the community-based policing model that is utilized in the schools serviced by the SBSO.

Gang Deputy Activity: Over the course of this reporting period, gang activity continued to challenge the resources of the law enforcement community on a countywide basis as well as in the City of Goleta. The Sheriff's Office Gang Unit is limited in size and comprised of two Senior Deputies that work countywide.

Community Resource Deputy (CRD): The Community Resource Deputy, Sr. Deputy Dave Valadez, activities and involvement include, but are not limited to, working with neighborhood and business watch programs, participating in the Safe Routes to School program, providing Ellwood Bluffs enforcement, coordinating bike and foot patrols in Old Town Goleta, participating with SRDs on enforcement and intervention with at-risk youth, South Coast Task Force on Youth Safety, Goleta Restorative Policing Program (Homeless Outreach), among a number of other important community-focused efforts.

Grants: Throughout calendar year 2018, the Sheriff's Office conducted various checkpoints with the use of grant funding obtained from the State of California's Office of Traffic Safety. During the 2017-18 Federal Fiscal year, \$85,000 was awarded for a combined DUI/Traffic Safety Enforcement Grant (Selective Traffic Enforcement ((STEP))/Avoid Lead Agency).

Criminal Investigations Division: During calendar year 2018, the detectives assigned to the Goleta Criminal Investigations Division investigated 786 of the 3,301 reports taken in the City of Goleta. Detectives cleared 86 cases by:

- Arrest (both adults and juveniles);
- Cleared by Exception Means;
- Complaints submitted to the District Attorney's Office or Juvenile Probation for filing;
- Missing persons being located;
- The crime had been committed outside of the City of Goleta and the case were sent to appropriate jurisdiction;
- Returned runaway juveniles; and/or
- Positive recourse between the victim and suspect.

In 2018, 296 cases were "suspended" due to:

- Lack of leads;
- Lack of evidence;
- Uncooperative victims;
- Determinations that cases were unfounded.

In the same period, 293 cases were "closed" with no further investigation and three cases were "unassigned." These were the result of misidentified investigations, re-classified investigations or insufficient evidence to prove a criminal act occurred. On December 31, 2018, Detectives had 25 still active cases pending further investigation. In conclusion, during 2018, the Criminal Investigations Division received an average of 65.6 criminal cases per month (an increase from the 53.5 criminal cases per month in 2017) for follow-up investigation resulting from crimes committed in the City of Goleta.

Additional Data of Interest:

"Calls for Service" slightly decreased from 23,919 in 2017 to 21,855 in 2018 (8.6% decrease); "Reports Written" increased from 3,139 in 2017 to 3,301 in 2018 (5.2% increase); and "Citations Written" increased from 849 in 2017 to 1,041 in 2018 (22.6% increase).

With the change in cost methodology from the previous Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) *positions-based* model to the new Deputy Sheriff Service Unit *time-based* model, the following table provides a summary of the of the information available to the City regarding hours available and used as well as time information on City units going into the County and vice versa:

Part One Crimes: The Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI) Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program collects statistics on the number of offenses known to law enforcement. In the traditional Summary Reporting System (SRS), there are eight crimes, or "Part One" offenses, (criminal homicide, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, larceny-theft, and arson) reported to the UCR Program. The UCR Program collects data about Part One offenses in order to measure the level and scope of crime occurring throughout the nation. The program's founders chose these offenses because they are serious crimes, they occur with regularity in all areas of the country, and they are likely to be reported to police.

It is important to keep in mind that the 2018 data on Part One Crimes is preliminary and must be placed into context with relatively recent changes in the laws related to decriminalization of certain non-violent offenses and realignment of prison populations (Proposition 47 and Assembly Bills 109/17 (AB 109/AB 117), respectively).

- Proposition 47, the ballot initiative passed by California voters on November 4, 2014, reduces certain drug possession felonies to misdemeanors. It also requires misdemeanor sentencing for petty theft, receiving stolen property and forging/writing bad checks when the amount involved is \$950 or less.

- AB 109 and AB 117, the tandem bills passed by the legislature and signed into law in 2011, were intended to help California close the revolving door of low-level inmates cycling in and out of state prisons. AB 109 allows non-violent, non-serious, and non-sex offenders to serve their sentence in county jails or out-of-custody "mandatory supervision" instead of state prisons.

The table on the following page provides year over year comparative information regarding **preliminary data** on Part One Crimes for South Santa Barbara County (including all the incorporated cities and unincorporated areas) and the City of Goleta for calendar years 2018 and 2017.

While percentage changes may vary from year to year, what may be a more insightful crime measurement are those that are based on per capita. In all total crime rates, the City's per capita crime rates in the table above are substantially lower when compared to the South County as a whole and the City of Santa Barbara, and are comparable to the Cities of Carpinteria, Buellton, and Solvang.

Moreover, with statistical information it is important to keep in mind that percentages can be misleading when sample sizes are small. Similarly, it is best not to assume trends in one direction or another based on changes on a year-to-year basis. For example, if one measure states a case of one in 2017 and three in 2018, the resulting percentage increase would be 300% even though there were only two additional cases compared to the first year.

Parking Enforcement: The following table provides a summary of the parking enforcement officer's activity in 2018.

SBSO Ongoing Projects and Efforts:

- Continued concentration on community-based programs which address quality of life issues;
- Identification of additional resources for graffiti abatement;
- Continued commercial traffic enforcement to prevent damage to infrastructure;
- Continued efforts to have no traffic fatalities;
- Pursuit of appropriate funding opportunities;
- Stabilized staffing of contract functions;
- Enhanced interaction of patrol/detective personnel with City staff and the public.

Recognition:

Since 2013, the City of Goleta has been recognized eight times by different organizations for being a safe community.

In 2018, the City was recognized as one of the safest places to live in California, according to a study conducted by the National Council for Home Safety and Security (NCHSS). The National Council for Home Safety and Security is composed of home security professionals throughout the US and advocates for safe communities and home safety. To generate city scores and rankings, the NCHSS reviewed the most recent FBI Uniform Crime Report statistics along with their own population data and research. To be eligible, cities must have a population over 10,000 and have submitted a complete crime report to the FBI. Cities were then ranked on the number of reported violent crimes and property crimes per 1,000 people, with violent crimes weighted more heavily. According to the NCHSS, the average California city has an average violent crime per 1,000 of 4.44, and an average property crime per 1,000 of 26.45. Goleta's score of 1.19 and 15.54 respectively, led to its ranking of #53 out of all California cities.

Santa Barbara County Fire Department

Traditional fire department services are provided by SBCFD as part of a county-wide fire protection district funded through property tax assessments. There are three fire stations located within the City of Goleta. Included in this report is information related to station staffing levels, types of service calls, and standards for fire protection in urbanized areas.

Fire Station 11, located at 6901 Frey Way, is SBCFD's Task Force Station. This station houses the specialists in urban search and rescue, trench rescue, confined space rescue and rescue systems 1 and 2, as certified by the State of California, Office of Emergency Services (OES). The station also houses the water rescue team who are trained and equipped to respond to swift water emergencies during storm events and incidents on and adjacent to the ocean. The water rescue team is cross-staffed by all station personnel assigned to Station 11, along with additional assistance from Fire Stations 12, 14, or 17 (UCSB) and the Battalion Chief.

Through the mutual aid system, the water rescue team is also able to call upon the emergency response services provided by the Sheriff's Department, City of Santa Barbara Harbor Patrol, Coast Guard and adjoining fire departments. Also housed at Station 11 is a canine arson team, with a dog and handler, which investigates arson cases. This team is one of three canine arson teams in the State of California and is available to respond throughout the State as needed.

There is one Battalion Chief assigned to the South Battalion, which includes the City of Goleta. The Battalion Chief is on duty 24 hours a day and is stationed at Fire Station 11. In addition, the South Battalion Chief is assisted by the Deputy Fire Marshal/Battalion Chief in all second alarm calls where assistance is required.

Station 11 staffs six personnel, three of which are assigned to Engine 11 and three assigned to Truck 11. Engine 11 consists of an engine company captain, engineer, and a firefighter paramedic. Engine 11 provides 24-hour paramedic service and responds to a variety of calls, including but not limited to wildland fires, structure fires, rescues, emergency medical, public assistance and other requests.

Truck 11 consists of a truck captain, engineer and tiller man (firefighter). It contains a 100-foot aerial ladder truck and responds to all incidents that require a rescue, as well as roof operations on any structure, or as determined by the incident commander. The truck company's advanced level of expertise allows for a rapid deployment of equipment and personnel to accommodate the mandated Cal-OSHA requirements of firefighter safety, known as the "two-in-two-out rule".

This rule requires a minimum of two personnel to be available outside a structure prior to entry by firefighters to provide an immediate rescue for trapped or fallen firefighters as well as immediate assistance in rescue operations. The Station 11 truck company and Water Rescue 11 respond countywide as needed.

Station 11 also houses the new hand-held device purchased by the City of Goleta to help Santa Barbara County firefighters detect and locate potentially dangerous odors more quickly. The monitor is more than 6,000 times more sensitive at detecting hydrogen sulfide than other devices that have been in use.

Fire Station 12 is located at 5330 Calle Real. This station houses an Engine and a 4-wheel drive wildland type engine known as a "Type III Engine" or "Brush Truck." It is staffed with three personnel consisting of an engine company captain, engineer and firefighter. The station provides immediate response on incidents as determined by the type of call. Of the three Fire Stations located in the City, Station 12 has the highest volume of Medical Emergency responses for Engine 12.

The ensuing table provides a comparison of the calls for service between Calendar Year 2017 and Calendar Year 2018 for Fire Station 12:

Fire Station 14 is located at 320 N. Los Carneros Road adjacent to the "Stow House". It is staffed with three personnel, consisting of an engine company captain, engineer, and firefighter. This station houses an Engine and a 4-wheel drive wildland type engine known as a "Type III Engine" or "Brush Truck." Due to Fire Station 14's centralized location in the middle of the Goleta Valley, this station will respond to all multi-engine responses such as structure fires.

The table below provides a comparison of the calls for service between Calendar Year 2017 and Calendar Year 2018 for Fire Station 14:

FISCAL IMPACTS:


The costs for Police Services are included in the City's operating budget. The General Fund expenditures for FY 2017-18 were \$8,315,525, or \$261.82 per resident, based on a population of 31,760 (January 2017).

The adopted General Fund budget for Police Services in FY 2018-19 is \$7,872,650, or \$246.41 per resident, based on a population of 31,949 (January 2018). The budgeted decrease was based on the new Deputy Sheriff Service Unit model. The existing 1-year agreement with the County for Law Enforcement Services is coming to an end on June 30, 2019.

City staff is currently working with SBSO staff on a one-year extension with the County for Law Enforcement Services, which would run from July 1, 2019, through June 30, 2020.

With regard to Fire Services, because the City lies within the boundaries of the Fire District, there are no associated costs to the City for services.







SBSO Traffic Citations and Tows

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SBSO Additional Statistics

In 2018, we had a decrease of 5.7% in Part One Crimes as we had 476 Total Reported in 2018 compared to 505 in 2017:

- Robbery decreased from 18 in 2017 to 11 in 2018;
- Burglary decreased from 101 in 2017 to 78 in 2018;
- Larceny-Theft decreased from 318 in 2017 to 303 in 2018;
- Motor Vehicle Theft increased from 32 in 2017 to 42 in 2018.

Our Violent Crimes Total increased from 51 in 2017 to 53 in 2018, a 3.9% increase, while Property Crimes total decreased from 454 in 2017 to 423 in 2018, a 6.8% decrease.

As was previously shown, “Calls for Service” decreased from 23,919 in 2017 to 21,855 (8.6% decrease); “Reports Written” increased from 3,139 in 2017 to 3,301 in 2018 (5.2% increase); and “Citations Written” increased from 849 in 2017 to 1,041 in 2018 (22.6% increase).

Recognition as a Safe City

Since 2013, Goleta has been recognized eight times by different organizations for being a safe community.

In 2018 Goleta continued to be positively ranked as a safe city as in years past.

- Goleta was ranked as the 53rd safest city in California (with populations of at least 10,000) by the National Council for Home Safety and Security (NCHSS).

The NCHSS uses the most recent FBI crime data available as the basis for their analyses and ranking. The evaluation takes into consideration factors such as security programs and initiatives and then pairs the data with their own research methodologies.

Traffic Safety Activities: During the course of Calendar Year 2018 the SBSO had 2 Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) grants: Oct 2017-Sept-2018 (\$85,000) and Oct 2018-Sept 2019 (\$85,000).
