SUBJECT: Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) 2020-2021 Consolidated

Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) and Proposed

Amendment to 2019 Action Plan

#### **RECOMMENDATIONS:**

A. Accept the Community Development Block Grant 2020-2021 CAPER and authorize staff to submit the CAPER to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development; and

B. Approve an amendment to the 2019 Action Plan to reallocate \$190,000 in CDBG-CV funding from an emergency rental assistance program to services for the homeless, and to reallocate \$12,500 in CDBG-CV funding from CommUnify's Senior Nutrition Program (now defunct) to the Organic Soup Kitchen for its weekly meal delivery program for seniors.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Each year, the City of Goleta receives funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for its Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program. In Fiscal Year 2020-21, the City of Goleta received \$225,504 in regular CDBG funding. The City also received another distribution of CDBG-CV coronavirus funding in the amount of \$268,947. Together with the earlier award of \$132,676 in CDBG-CV funding, this brought the total coronavirus CDBG aid awarded to the City of Goleta up to \$401,623. The purpose of Goleta's regular CDBG program is to carry out community revitalization projects and provide services that assist low- and moderate-income persons in the Goleta community. The purpose of the CDBG-CV coronavirus funding is to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus. The City of Goleta's use of CDBG-CV funding focused on assisting the homeless and low-income people who have been negatively impacted by the pandemic through loss of occupation, loss of wages, and/or increased childcare expenses.

Under HUD regulations for grant funds, the City is required to prepare an end-of year report referred to as the Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER). The CAPER summarizes the City's achievements for the previous CDBG program year, covering grant activities from July 1, 2020, through June 30, 2021. Although HUD required the activities for CDBG-CV funding to be included as amendments to the 2019-2020 Action Plan, these activities were actually carried out in program year 2020-2021 and so are reported in this CAPER.

A 15-day public review period for the 2020-2021 draft CAPER was provided from August 20, 2021, through September 3, 2020, as required by HUD, to provide the community with an opportunity to comment on the grantee's performance. Notices were published in both English and Spanish in the Santa Barbara Independent on August 19, 2021. Due to the COVID-19 coronavirus pandemic, hard copies of the draft CAPER were not made available at City Hall, Goleta Valley Public Library, and the Goleta Valley Community Center as was customarily done. Instead, the document was posted on the City's website, both as an "In the News" item on the main web page and at the CDBG web page: <a href="https://www.tinyurl.com/goletacdbg">www.tinyurl.com/goletacdbg</a>. No public comments were received by the time this report was published.

With regard to the proposed 2019 Action Plan Amendment, the City is proposing to move \$190,000 in CDBG-CV coronavirus funding from an emergency rental assistance program (to be managed by the County Housing Authority) to services for the homeless. At the Council meeting of August 17, 2021, the City Council directed staff to proceed with the Action Plan Amendment so the City could contract from homeless outreach services and bridge housing for the homeless to be provided by CityNet. A 15-day public review period for this proposed Action Plan Amendment was also included in the above-referenced public notice published in both English and Spanish in the Santa Barbara Independent on August 19, 2021.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

Comprehensive planning guidance for the City's CDBG program is provided through a five-year Consolidated Plan, a document required by HUD for agencies that receive CDBG funding. The Consolidated Plan details how the City will help meet national CDBG objectives, which include the provision of decent, affordable housing, a suitable living environment, and expanded economic opportunities especially for low- and moderate-income persons. The Consolidated Plan establishes objectives and accomplishment targets for the five-year program time period. The 2020-2021 Action Plan represented year one of the 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan implementation. The 2020-2021 draft CAPER (Attachment 1) reports on the accomplishment of goals included in the 2020-2021 Action Plan.

In addition, the CAPER relates the information on the performance targets (goals) from the past program year to the overall five-year Consolidated Plan period. Critical to the City's accomplishments are various nonprofit subrecipient organizations receiving a City of Goleta CDBG award to provide social services for the Goleta community. In FY 2020-21, accomplishments were seen in services to those experiencing homelessness, youth services, and services to the general low-income populations. The CAPER reports on

quantitative data in addition to narrative discussions in the areas of housing, homeless needs, non-homeless special needs, the City's anti-poverty strategy, public facilities and infrastructure, and other miscellaneous accomplishments. Social services and public facility accomplishments from FY 2020-21 are summarized in the below subsections.

#### **Social Services**

Table 1 below summarizes program accomplishments of subrecipient nonprofit organizations that received Goleta CDBG funds in 2020-21. These achievements are compared against the target goals established at the beginning of the year in the Action Plan. The table also includes organization that received CDBG-CV funding for public services in program year 2020-21.

<sup>\*</sup>HUD has since disallowed use of these funds for individual assistance grants, determining that funds may not be issued directly to individuals in need. City staff is working with HUD on how to rectify the issue and will report back to City Council at a later date.

As the table above shows, the total number of people assisted was 3,730 which is overall well above the target goal of 2,550 for the program year. Unfortunately, in some case, some of the annual goals were not met because fewer clients could be served or housed due to social distancing requirements of the COVID-19 pandemic. However, in other cases, the needs were exacerbated by the pandemic, resulting in more people served.

#### **Public Facilities**

The 2020-21 CDBG Action Plan included \$146,602 for capital improvement projects. These funds were allocated to Mathilda Park Improvements project. The improvements include drainage issues and unsafe conditions created when it rains. In addition, because there are no other playgrounds in the area that are ADA accessible, the walkway leading to the playground will be improved to meet ADA requirements. This project was delayed due to COVID-19 pandemic issues and City staff capacity. However, an agreement for design has been drafted and is pending execution. The design process is expected to move quickly once the agreement is executed with RRM Design Group.

#### Amendments to 2019 Action Plan for Reallocation of CDBG-CV Funding

The Grant Funding Review Committee met on August 2, 2021, to consider two separate CDBG-CV reallocation requests from City staff. The first of these would move \$190,000 of CDBG-CV money which had been earmarked for Emergency Tenant Based Rental Assistance to the pool of funds set-aside in the City's FY 2021/22 budget for homelessness initiatives. Staff believes reallocating the \$190,000 in CDBG-CV funding from the Emergency Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program with the Housing Authority of Santa Barbara County to homelessness initiatives would be a better use of these funds, given the amount of rental assistance available at the State and County levels. The California Tenant Relief Act established a State Emergency Rental Assistance Program with \$14 million in Emergency Rental Assistance for Santa Barbara County residents. County of Santa Barbara tenants that have experienced a loss of income due to the COVID-19 pandemic and can demonstrate the need for rental support may apply for rent and utility debts dating back to March 2020. These funds are available for eligible City of Goleta renters. In addition, the U.S. American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) has allocated \$16.6 million to the County for its own emergency rental assistance program, to be implemented after the State funding has been exhausted. These funds will also be available to eligible City of Goleta renters. Given the amount of assistance available for eligible renters, staff and the Grant Funding Review Committee recommend that the \$190,000 in CDBG-CV funding be reallocated to homelessness initiatives, and specifically, for an agreement with CityNet to provide outreach services, case management and bridge housing for the homeless.

On June 18, 2021, City staff received a letter from CAC/CommUnify that the agency would be discontinuing the senior nutrition program effective July 1, 2021. They indicated that the program had been operating in the red by approximately \$600,000 annually despite their best efforts in fundraising. The Area Agency on Aging has been trying to locate another provider but had no response to an issued Request for Proposals and no interest from anyone expressed so far. Because HUD would like to see CDBG-CV funding utilized quickly, staff is proposing that this \$12,500 in CDBG-CV funding be awarded to another organization providing food to low-income seniors or predominantly senior clients. Staff contacted four organizations that applied for 2021-2022 grant funding that have food programs serving seniors. These include the Foodbank of Santa Barbara County, Food From the Heart, Area Agency on Aging and Organic Soup Kitchen. After deliberating the features of each program and potential number of seniors who could be served, the Committee voted to recommend that the funding be reallocated to the Organic Soup

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Kitchen for its weekly meal delivery program to seniors. The Organic Soup Kitchen will be able to serve 50 low-income seniors with 21 weekly soup meals. Most are suffering from cancer or other chronic illnesses.

The mechanism to achieve an amendment to the 2019 Action Plan is to prepare a HUD form seeking such amendment. Other than provide direction to staff, Council is not required to memorialize its authorization through any other documentation.

#### **FISCAL IMPACTS:**

For Fiscal Year 2021-22, the City's CDBG program allocation from HUD is \$230,558. HUD allows for up to 20 percent of the total allocation to be spent on CDBG program planning and administration activities. As a result, \$46,100 has been allocated to planning and administration for FY 2021-22 which includes preparation of the CAPER for 2020. Staff time spent preparing the 2020-21 CAPER will be paid out of this allocation and charged to account 402-60-6300-59000 (Transfer to General Fund).

#### **ALTERNATIVES:**

City Council is requested to approve the CAPER in Attachment 1. Staff will incorporate any public comments received and any requested updates from Council into the final version that gets submitted to HUD. The CAPER must be submitted to HUD by September 15, 2021. If the CAPER is not submitted in the appropriate timeframe, it could jeopardize future CDBG funding for the City.

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#### CR-05 - Goals and Outcomes

# Progress the jurisdiction has made in carrying out its strategic plan and its action plan. 91.520(a)

The City made progress towards its five-year goals for public services of assisting 15,000 people. For the 2020-2021 Action Plan, the target for public services was 2,550 people served. The actual number assisted was 3,678 people. The Santa Barbara Neighborhood Clinics served the largest number of people at their Goleta Medical Clinic, assisting 2,087 unique Goleta residents. The Santa Barbara Foundation also assisted 1,275 individuals through its grants to other non-profits serving low- to moderate-income people. Another 316 Goleta residents were assisted in various ways through after-school youth programs and children's learning centers, community resource outreach, and transitional housing and case management services for the homeless. This year all of the program goals were met.

During the 2020-2021 program year, the City adopted its first Homelessness Strategic Plan (HSP). In the area of providing overnight shelter to persons experiencing homelessness, the City used its General Fund to contract with a local shelter provider (PATH) to provide shelter beds for Goleta area homeless. Three people were sheltered at PATH for 179 bed nights during PY 2020-2021. Another 52 people were assisted by Transition House at their emergency shelter and/or through their transitional housing program. The City also assisted 44 Goleta residents experiencing homelessness who reside in their vehicles through funding to New Beginnings Counseling Center's Safe Parking Program.

Under the goal of improving public facilities and infrastructure, the City is designing improvements to the Goleta Valley Community Center to make it compliant with Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements. The project design process began late in the program year, but funds are expected to be completely utilized in PY 2021-2022.

The City's Consolidated Plan - Strategic Plan identified affordable housing as a high priority; however, there were no five-year numeric accomplishment goals for new housing units in the Strategic Plan due to lack of monetary resources. Despite this, during the 2020-2021 Program Year, construction was completed on the remaining two of fourteen Winslowe affordable housing units using non-CDBG funds.

On November 5, 2020, the City conducted a public hearing on how to expend a second allocation of CDBG-CV coronavirus funds under the CARES Act in the amount of \$268,947. The City chose to provide assistance to Transition House to provide case management and transitional housing to homeless families with children, to United Way to assist lower-income residents adversely affected by the pandemic, and to United Way for its Children's Learning and Enrichment Centers to help children and parents who were dealing with remote learning and childcare challenges due to the pandemic. A CDBG-CV subrecipient grant of \$12,500 was awarded to CommUnity for a Senior Nutrition Program.

CommUnify recently notified that the City that it would be terminating that program so the City is in the process of reallocating these funds. The City Council will consider recommendations from its Grant Funding Review Committee to relocate this funding to the Organic Soup Kitchen for a program that also serves seniors with weekly soup meals delivered to their homes. In addition, the City is considering a

reallocation of \$190,000 in CDBG-CV funding from an Emergency Rental Assistance Program to homelessness services/activities. Given the high level of funding available at the State and County levels for emergency rental assistance, best use of the funds may be to assist the homeless and implement the HSP. A substantial amendment to the 2019-2020 Action Plan Amendment will be considered on September 7, 2021, for possibly reallocation of this funding.

Assess how the jurisdiction's use of funds, particularly CDBG, addresses the priorities and specific objectives identified in the plan, giving special attention to the highest priority activities identified.

The City's Strategic Plan identified the following highest priorities: 1) Services for the Homeless; 2) Non-Housing Community Development; and 3) Affordable Housing (although due to limited resources, no CDBG target goals were established). The priority category of Non-Housing Community Development was intended to encompass a wide range of priorities in the areas of public services (including services to the homeless), infrastructure enhancements/repairs and public improvements serving low- to moderate-income persons and areas of the City, predominantly Old Town, where the majority of low- to moderate-income people reside. Public improvements focused on pedestrian improvements.

For this program year, the City focused its CDBG funding on activities that would address these priorities and the objectives of the Consolidated Plan in the areas of public services for seniors, youth and low-income people, services for the homeless, and ADA improvements in the City's

Community Center. Specifically, in support of the Plan's highest priorities, the City's CDBG and CDBG-CV funding supported a senior nutrition program, youth programs (Isla Vista Youth Projects and United Way Children's Learning Centers), programs for the homeless including transitional housing and safe parking program for residents residing in their vehicles due to homelessness (Transition House and New Beginnings Counseling Center), and health care services for low-income people (Santa Barbara Neighborhood Clinics).

Although the Consolidated Plan did not establish specific objectives for affordable housing, the City had established annual goals in this area and was able to make substantial progress. Construction of the final two affordable units at the Winslowe Project was completed.

#### Narrative

The prepopulated table does not include all the races of people served this program year. The most significant category not shown is "Other or Multi-Racial" which included 1,107 individuals. Also not shown were "American Indian/Alaskan Native AND White" (2 individuals), "Asian AND White" (1 person) and "American Indian/Alaskan Native AND Black/African American" (27 people). This brings the total number of people assisted to 3,730.

#### **Narrative**

Goleta's Old Town district, which lies within Census Tract 30.01, contains the City's highest concentration of low- to moderate-income residents and is the only census tract that exceeds the HUD exception threshold for Goleta. Sixty-five percent of Goleta's CDBG allocation is devoted to capital projects and public improvement infrastructure projects in Old Town.

The City's other high priority activity is to address the accessibility needs for those persons with disabilities. For that reason, the City allocated its 2020-2021 CDBG public facilities funds to addressing those needs in the Goleta Valley Community Center. This project just got underway late in the program year so only \$22,608.79 was expended during the program year.

#### Leveraging

Explain how federal funds leveraged additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements were satisfied, as well as how any publicly owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that were used to address the needs identified in the plan.

All sources and types of matching funds are more limited now due to the current economic climate, along with the demise of California redevelopment tax-increment funds and housing set-aside funds, and drawdown of local housing trust funds. However, as in the past, the City will be as creative as possible to find other sources of funding from state, federal, private developer, state tax-credit, or local funding, such as the housing trust funds, to develop and deliver efficient and cost-effective projects. Although the City's CDBG allocation is limited relative to the cost of new housing and public improvements, these CDBG funds can serve as matching funds for other grant opportunities or can provide a much-needed funding gap, when local resources fall short.

In addition to its CDBG entitlement grant, the City of Goleta allocated General Fund monies towards public services, dedicated other grant funds, such as the State of California Housing-Related Parks Program, and leveraged State Gas Tax, ATP and Measure A funding for the various infrastructure improvements in Old Town, the area with the highest percentage of low- to moderate-income residents.

The City provided \$28,250 from its General Fund to contract with People Assisting the Homeless (PATH) for provision of two reserved beds in its PATH Santa Barbara homeless shelter/transitional housing program to serve Goleta area homeless who are ready to enter a shelter and receive case management services. The City also invested \$100,000 in City General Fund grants, many to organizations serving low-income people and the homeless. The City has consistently supported Home for Good, a county-wide, collective impact collaborative of government agencies, non-profit organizations, foundations, faith communities, business and community leaders, other community groups, and individuals who have experienced homelessness.

The City of Goleta looked to help avoid low-income people from becoming homeless by providing rental and eviction prevention assistance by providing a two-year contract of \$32,750 in General Funds with the City of Santa Barbara's Rental Housing Mediation Program (RHMP), which provided information to predominantly low- income tenants about their rights; assistance to people served with eviction notices; and mediation between tenants and landlords to help people avoid eviction and address other problems.

# Discuss the difference between goals and outcomes and problems encountered in meeting these goals.

No goals were included in the five-year Consolidated Plan for affordable housing since the City of Goleta has limited resources with which to develop new affordable units and often relies on private developers to do so in conjunction with other projects. Using local funds, the City was able to construct the final two of fourteen affordable owner-occupied units in the. The completed units are now sold and occupied.

Most of the annual goals for its public services were met due to the CDBG-CV funding for the COVID-19 pandemic. The CDBG-funded ADA improvements for the Goleta Valley Community Center were delayed so seismic improvements could be incorporated into the project design of the building. The design for this project began late in the program year.

#### Discuss how these outcomes will impact future annual action plans.

These outcomes will not directly impact future action plans. Staff will continue to research and explore public/private partnerships in the construction and development of affordable housing. The City will continue to look for opportunities to leverage County HOME funds and affordable housing in-lieu fees to assist private developers in the construction of new affordable housing. As mentioned previously, one project was completed during the program year. The final two of fourteen affordable ownership units in Winslowe Project (seven units at moderate-income and seven units at above-moderate income) were completed during the program year. All of the housing units have been sold and are now occupied. None of these units were completed with CDBG funds.

#### **Narrative Information**

As mentioned above, in the 2020-2021 Program Year, construction was completed on the final two of 14 affordable owner-occupied units in the Winslowe Project. All fourteen of the units have been sold and are now occupied, seven of which are occupied by moderate-income families.

# Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The City of Goleta strived to reduce homelessness and to assist those who are homeless and unsheltered by using a portion of its CDBG and CDBG-CV awards to support agencies and organizations whose mission is to provide case management and other services to homeless persons. The City supported programs and activities that also specifically engaged in outreach to the homeless not residing in shelters. This program year the City provided a \$11,276 CDBG award and a \$6,447 CDBG-CV award to New Beginnings, which operated a safe parking program for homeless persons residing in their vehicles. This program included outreach and case management. In addition, the City set aside two Cityowned parking lots to assist with this program.

The City also adopted its first Homelessness Strategic Plan (HSP) during the program year. The HSP sets forth goals, priorities and objectives in the area of homelessness and providing services to the homeless, and is intended to guide funding decisions in this area.

### Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City provided \$10,000 in CDBG-CV funding to Transition House. Transition House is the only homeless shelter for families with children in southern Santa Barbara County. Transition House provides a multitude of services and case management to homeless families with the goal of moving them from emergency shelter to transitional housing then permanent housing. Transition House also received a \$4,950 City General Fund Grant.

In addition to allocating some of its CDBG funding, the City invested \$25,000 in City General Funds to reserve two beds in the PATH Santa Barbara homeless shelter, reserved for homeless individuals from Goleta. A total of three people utilized these two beds over the program year.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

The City of Goleta looked to help avoid low-income people from becoming homeless by providing rental and eviction prevention assistance through the City's two-year contract with

the City of Santa Barbara's Rental Housing Mediation Program (RHMP). The City of Goleta provided \$32,750 in General Fund money to support the RHMP which provided information to predominantly low- income tenants about their rights; assistance to people served with eviction notices; and mediation between tenants and landlords to help people avoid eviction and address other problems. As mentioned earlier, the City of Goleta also allocated a portion of its CDBG funding to homeless service providers and nonprofits that provided various services and assistance to low-income people, including utility assistance, weekly food baskets, and medical assistance. These services filled the gaps for those families and individuals that were on the verge of becoming homeless and allowed them to dedicate more of their financial resources to housing costs.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City of Goleta's goals included reducing the incidence of homelessness, and addressing the needs of homeless persons, including making the transition to permanent housing and independent living. The City helped achieve this through its support of agencies that provided these services, as well as through participation in area organizations that shared these goals. As mentioned above, one of those organizations was the Home for Good collaborative of which included the City of Goleta is a member. The City provided General Fund support to Home for Good for its regional, collaborative effort focused on housing those without homes that brought together homeless services agencies, government, community-based organizations, other local groups, non-profits, foundations, faith communities, street friends, business and community leaders, and individuals. The goals of Home for Good included preventing homelessness and supporting the expansion of housing for the homeless. The City also provided an \$11,276 CDBG award and a \$6,447 CDBG-CV award to New Beginnings to assist the vehicular homeless in finding safe overnight parking and connecting people to permanent housing solutions.

The City also provided a \$10,000 CDBG-CV Grant to Transition House, an emergency shelter with support services for local homeless families with children that works to transition homeless families from its shelter to permanent housing.

## CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)

#### Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

There are no public housing units in Goleta, since all public housing has been converted to Affordable Tax Credit/Project-Based housing. The Housing Authority of the County of Santa Barbara serves Santa Barbara County and the City of Goleta. Within the City of Goleta, the Housing Authority receives Section 8 rental assistance for 164 of its affordable rental housing units, including four units for special needs people. The Housing Authority was founded on the belief that decent, safe and sanitary housing is central to the physical and emotional health, productivity, and self-esteem of the people it serves. The agency's mission is to provide affordable housing opportunities for low income households in the County of Santa Barbara (including Goleta) in an environment which preserves personal dignity, and in a manner, which maintains the public trust.

The Housing Authority has accomplished the conversion of its public housing projects through the establishment of a nonprofit affiliate; disposition of the units to this nonprofit affiliate; and then use of tax-exempt financing/credits to finance rehabilitation of the units. The units remain affordable and Section 8 vouchers have been issued for any tenants displaced during renovation of the units.

As funding allows, the Housing Authority of Santa Barbara County has carried out modifications needed in its public housing stock based on the Section 504 Needs Assessment. A review of the Housing Authority's 2020 Agency Action Plan did not indicate any new or rehabilitation projects in the City of Goleta for 2020-2021. Please refer to the Public Housing Authority's Annual Plan for further information.

# Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

Each public housing project owned and/or managed by the Housing Authority of the County of Santa Barbara has an established Resident Council, whose members are elected by residents in that project. The Council holds regular public meetings and brings concerns and recommendations directly to the Housing Authority. The Housing Authority also has a Section 8 homeownership program, although the high cost of housing limits it. The Housing Authority also administers a Mortgage Credit Certificate Program that assists lower income first-time homebuyers. The City did not take any additional actions beyond what the Housing Authority did.

#### Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs

The Housing Authority of Santa Barbara County is not troubled.

## CR-35 - Other Actions 91.220(j)-(k); 91.320(i)-(j)

Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)

In the City of Goleta, the largest barrier to the development of affordable housing continued to be the extremely high cost of real estate and development costs. There are also considerable governmental constraints to affordable housing development that include land use policies governed by the Land Use Element of the General Plan and the zoning and development codes, and development fees imposed by the jurisdiction. The City's Housing Element is required to provide a detailed assessment of public policy constraints and to develop strategies to alleviate the constraints on development of new housing, and particularly, those that act as barriers to affordable housing.

On March 3, 2020, the City of Goleta adopted a new zoning ordinance; carefully examined current development standards, land use policies, and permit processing requirements to remove unnecessary barriers to development of affordable housing. This included an examination of current land use controls to determine where processing efficiencies can be improved.

The City Council also took action to eliminate development impact fees for accessory dwelling units (ADUs) under 750 square feet which, prior to that action, were approximately \$23,000 per unit. Those fees were another financial hurdle that made the development of affordable ADUs difficult to achieve.

#### Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Goleta provided the maximum amount of CDBG funding (15% of its allocation) towards public services, which addressed the needs of youth, the homeless and low-income people in general, including essential needs such as health care and assistance dealing with the negative effects of the coronavirus pandemic.

There is a need within the City, particularly the City's Old Town district, for public facilities to serve underserved populations in this area and rehabilitate aging facilities. There is also a need in other areas of the City for ADA accessibility upgrades. Needed public facilities include parks and recreational amenities, flood control improvements, sidewalks and street improvements. To address these unmet needs, the City allocated its 2020-2021 CDBG funds to address ADA improvements and drainage deficiencies within Mathilda Park. The design work is just about to get underway for those improvements and design is expected to be completed in the next few months.

In an effort to address underserved needs, City staff also continued to research availability of future funding resources and used proactive approaches toward applications for potential to leverage its CDBG funds.

#### Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The Santa Barbara County Public Health Department works in coordination with the California Department of Health Services, Childhood Lead Poisoning Branch for program planning, outreach, case management, investigation, and surveillance of lead poisoned children.

A Public Health Nurse (PHN) identifies and provides case management to lead-burdened children throughout the county and provides outreach and education to the community. A multi-departmental Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention (CLPP) Team, which includes representatives from the Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) program, California Children Services (CCS), Environmental Health Services, Community Health Division Program Administration, and the County Fire Department-HAZMAT (hazardous materials), meets quarterly to plan outreach activities, prepare educational materials, resolve current issues, and discuss responsibilities in investigating lead poisoning cases. This program has increased lead screening done on children at risk for lead poisoning.

The City of Goleta also made copies of the most recent EPA publication, Renovate Right: Important Lead Hazard Information for Families, Child Care Providers and Schools available to the public at City Hall. In addition, the City's Planning and Environmental Review Department provided the most recent EPA educational brochures on lead poisoning to anyone seeking a permit or information for renovation of a residence, day care center or school which includes work on a structure older than 1978. The City does not use CDBG funds to rehabilitate housing units.

#### Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Goleta supported various public service programs, both with its CDBG funding and its own General Funds, to provide essential services aimed at helping to reduce the number of poverty-level families. This included support of programs such as the Santa Barbara Neighborhood Clinics that meets the critical needs of families by providing free to low-cost medical and dental care to low-income people, and providing funding to Isla Vista Youth Project to address a variety of needs for low-income families with children. CDBG-CV funding was also provided to the Santa Barbara Foundation to support non-profits responding to the needs of low-income people negatively impacted by the pandemic. CDBG-CV funding was also provided to Transition House to provide emergency housing, case management and a path to transitional and then permanent housing.

#### Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

One of the institutional gaps identified was that few services are located in the City of Goleta, so residents have to travel to receive services. The City continued to work with service providers to offer services in Goleta and support those programs with CDBG and/or City General Fund money. This year the City assisted the Santa Barbara Neighborhood Clinics in support and expansion of their medical clinic and dental clinic in Goleta that provide free or low-cost medical and dental care to Goleta residents.

# Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City continued to collaborate with public and private housing and social service agencies to meet the goals and objectives of the Consolidated Plan. This included ongoing meetings, special meetings and/or participation on relevant tasks forces such as the South Coast Housing Task Force and the Home for Good

# Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)

Because the City participates in the Santa Barbara HOME consortium, the City participated in the preparation of the Analysis of Impediments (AI). It was completed by the consortium without specific goals for Goleta. However, the City has contributed to the overall County goals in addressing the following action items in the County's AI:

- Increase affordable housing opportunities
- Increase focus on and partnerships to better coordinate service delivery to at-risk populations
- Provide greater access to financial counseling for minority and Hispanic applicants and increase outreach to lenders to address concerns in denial rates; and
- Continue supporting programs to improve landlord tenant relationship and fair housing education.

The City of Goleta continued to contract with the City of Santa Barbara for its Rental Housing Mediation Program (RHMP) services, which provided education and information about landlord/tenant rights and responsibilities. The contract also provides for telephone mediation in rental housing disputes. A total of 115 people was assisted by Goleta funding for this Program. Services included staff consultations, provision of information and printed materials relating to Landlord-Tenant rights and responsibilities, referrals to social service agencies, and mediation services to resolve tenant/landlord disputes. The City also maintained a Fair Housing page on the City's web site to provide information in Spanish and English directed to educating residents regarding their rights under Fair Housing laws and how they may obtain assistance if they believe they are victims of discrimination.

In addition to links to the RMMP, there are links on the City fair housing webpage to the Legal Aid Foundation, California Department of Fair Employment and Housing and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Office of Fair Housing. On the site is a link to California Guide to Residential Tenants' and Landlords' Rights and Responsibilities, the City's Analysis of Impediments for Fair Housing Choice, HUD's Tenant Rights, Laws and Protections - California and National Association of Realtors Fair Housing Information.

#### CR-40 - Monitoring 91.220 and 91.230

Describe the standards and procedures used to monitor activities carried out in furtherance of the plan and used to ensure long-term compliance with requirements of the programs involved, including minority business outreach and the comprehensive planning requirements

To implement an effective CDBG program, the City monitors CDBG activities on a consistent basis through quarterly desktop reviews of quarterly performance reports submitted by subrecipients, client data and invoices and expense reports submitted. On-site monitoring visits also assist in determining if the subrecipient is carrying out its program and activities within the parameters denoted in the subrecipient agreement. Monitoring also ensures that the required records are maintained to demonstrate compliance with applicable regulations. While quarterly reporting is required for all CDBG sub-recipients, City CDBG administrative staff typically conducts in-depth, onsite monitoring reviews of each subrecipient every 2-3 years (or more frequently if necessary) to ensure program compliance with HUD regulations. Unfortunately, during this program year, due to the COVID-19 coronavirus pandemic, the City was unable to conduct the more in-depth, onsite monitoring review it would typically do for select agencies. For the other quarterly monitoring of data reports and invoicing, no findings or concerns were identified. The City is expects to be able to conduct more in-depth on-site monitoring of subrecipients in Program Year 2021-2022.

For corrective actions, when identified, subrecipients are given written notifications of violations within 30 days of the review date and are required to submit corrections within thirty days of the date of the compliance review letter in order to avoid noncompliance penalties such as more frequent reporting and/or additional file audits. Throughout the program year, CDBG administrative staff also provided technical assistance, as needed, to the City Public Works Department in relation to CDBG-funded capital projects, and to subrecipients in relation to administrative as well as financial compliance with all HUD regulations.

#### Citizen Participation Plan 91.105(d); 91.115(d)

Describe the efforts to provide citizens with reasonable notice and an opportunity to comment on performance reports.

The City published a public notice in English and Spanish providing a 15-day public review period for the Draft CAPER and providing an opportunity for the public to submit comments. This notice was published in the Santa Barbara Independent, the major weekly newspaper in the area, on August 19, 2021. A notice of availability of the Draft CAPER and request for comments was also posted on the City's website. The Draft CAPER was also considered by the City Council at a public hearing on September 7, 2021, providing another opportunity for the public to comment on this annual performance report document for the CDBG program. Any comments received during the public review period and at the City Council meeting will be incorporated into the Final CAPER submitted to HUD.

Our staff really appreciated having you celebrate National Health Center Week 2021! It was prideful for our organization to receive a Resolution and our two staff honorees felt really acknowledged for the work they do. The City of Goleta has been so very active in health related matters, even before the Pandemic, so that set the City's priorities well for Goleta's residents during this unprecedented period. This has been a challenging period and those on the front lines have been noble in serving the community. Having both you and the Mayor participate in events with our organization over the past 7 years, since we opened our clinics there, has demonstrated you also believe in healthy people are necessary for a healthy community. I would also be remiss not too mention our gratefulness for the being recipients of City of Goleta Community Development Block Grant funding over the past 5 years.

With that in mind on Friday, August 20, 2021, we did receive the City's Community Development Block Grant Year-End Report and Reallocation of Funding Public Input Request. We were delighted to read the report of Santa Barbara Neighborhood Clinics serving "the largest number of people at their Goleta Medical Clinic, assisting 2,087 unique Goleta residents." It appears that the \$190,000 in Reallocation of Funding may already be spoken for, however the suggestion is to "use the funding to assist people living in encampments, the streets, and RVs to get needed services and housing." Assistance for housing is an excellent priority, and I would like to mention that services, including healthcare, medical, dental and behavioral are a necessary part of being able to stay in a shelter and retain housing. You might be interested in knowing that the Santa Barbara Neighborhood Clinics served 712 unique individuals with 93117 zip codes who meet the criteria of being without a home, during the first 7 months of 2021. As you contemplate the reallocation of funding, I would request that careful consideration be made about housing and services, not forgetting healthcare continuing to be a priority for the City in conjunction with other services that will be needed to assist those who are shelter challenged at this time.

Thank you again for recognizing important community needs and being judicious in the process of fund reallocation.

Dear Ms. Dato,

"The City is also seeking public input on a substantial amendment to the 2019-2020 CDBG Action Plan that would reallocate \$190,000 in CDBG-CV funds from an Emergency Rental Assistance Program to homelessness outreach and assistance. There are currently millions of dollars available at the State and County level for rental assistance, so the City proposes to use the funding to assist people living in encampments, the streets and RVs get needed services and housing. The City also proposes to reallocate \$12,500 in CDBG-CV funding to a food program for low-income seniors."

I am not in favor of moving \$190,000 in Community Development funds to homeless outreach, unless those homeless are originally from this area, or have lived in this area for at least 5+ years. I am in favor of helping our own longer-term residents with rent, with food, with needed repairs, but SB/G is such a pleasant environment compared to most of the country, that we regularly draw in homeless from across the country, and I'm against helping those from outside our community before we help those from inside our community.

I now live half time in Goleta, and half time in another state, because Goleta literally zoned us out of business, and CA was so hostile to our small business that it no longer made economic sense to persist there. We intend to return to full time living in Goleta when we sell our small business and retire within the next few years.

I've lived in Goleta for 50 years, as has my husband, and my (now deceased folks), and my brother and his wife (who was born here), etc. We're all tired of those who built the town and who have labored here for decades being forced to go elsewhere, while those who don't have the same roots or work ethic are given government encouragement, help, and assistance. My siblings were never able to buy, and will have to move away when they retire to make sure they have enough to live comfortably on, and they've spent their entire lives contributing to the Goleta community.

I know way too many children of such workers who can't even afford to rent a room after they reach maturity, so they depart too. Continuing to make the community denser with those from elsewhere, and helping those from elsewhere, while losing those from here, is not the sort of policy that a responsible government would support.

Thank you for your consideration of my viewpoint, regardless of what finally transpires.
